


6 November AGM

Pat telling tales from the past 30 years at the Pleasure Boat Inn



30th Anniversary

70 members and partners celebrated the Club's 30th anniversary at the Pleasure Boat Inn, Hickling which also marked 30 years of committee service by two founder members: Pat Fenn, and Tony Myhill.



There was a fair amount of reminiscing at the event, which hosted the largest gathering of windsurf Club members for a couple of decades. The Pleasure Boat Inn served a Hog Roast in the lovely garden and patio area, an idyllic setting close to the Broad. £216 was also raised for the charity W4CR (Windsurfing for Cancer Research) in memory of windsurfer Paul Perry.

Founder members Pat and Tony were presented with bottled samples of Hickling water and sediment, which was said may well contain traces of the estimated 1,000 or so windsurfing members who have sailed over the previous 3 decades. They also received a framed windsurfing photograph which symbolises both the unique beauty of the Club's surrounding and also the addictive thrill of windsurfing in strong winds.



Hickling Broad is one of the best inland waters for sailing in the UK due to its close proximity to the sea and being surrounded by wide open space. There was an explosion in the growth of windsurfing back in the early 80s, when at one point 1 in 6 households owned a windsurfer. As a result, access to Hickling Broad opposite the Pleasure Boat Inn was regularly grid-locked with car-park congestion and dozens of windsurfers struggling to get access to the beach at the end of the public right of way by

the dyke. A meeting was held in the very same pub in 1984 to help control the windsurfing for the benefit of all water users, and the Hickling Windsurfing Club was born. The Club soon moved to it's own car park opposite Hickling Staithe and its own beach just along from the Whispering Reeds boat yard which provides private and safe access to the broad.

Tony Myhill who grew up in Hickling, was instrumental in building the car park, beach, and in 2007 the Club's changing rooms and showering facilities. Tony is also an RYA coach and instructor, and was involved with the early



of training Nick Dempsey who won a Windsurfina silver medal for GB at the 2012 Olympics at Weymouth. Tony also а windsurfing business from his current home Wymondham.

Pat Fenn is Commercial Director of a Norwich based company, and provided the solid business foundation and leadership on which the club could thrive. His appetite for sports has latterly extended to motor racing and flying. The club's members value the club for it's friendly and supportive culture, which can be traced back to Tony and Pat's influence.

More recently the Club has also produced two national windsurfing champions: Tom Bennett-Lloyd youth UK wave sailing champion, and Ben Harwood UK youth freestyle champion.

Despite a general decline in windsurfing since 1984, the club has maintained a steady membership of around 150 single and family memberships. The club's offering includes: excellent facilities, loan equipment, public come and try days, free training, buddy system, and club events through the year. The 30th event was such a success they are aiming to have a summer BBQ at the Pleasure Boat Inn every year.
